

Canine Health Foundation News Alert

Van Andel Research Institute Launches New Canine Cancer Studies! Your Participation is Needed in the Collection of Tumor Samples [Tuesday, June 15, 2010]

The Van Andel Research Institute, in Grand Rapids, Michigan, received a "Grand Opportunities" (GO grant) from the National Institutes of Health. This is enabling the Institute to expand its canine cancer studies, which started with a project partially funded by the Canine Health Foundation investigating hemangiosarcoma in Clumber Spaniels 18 months ago, into a much broader research program. They are launching a new center of excellence in canine genetics and genomics. The first and most important program is the Canine Hereditary Cancer Consortium (CHCC), which is headed by Drs. Jeff Trent (TGen), Nick Duesbery (Van Andel Research Institute), and Paul Meltzer (National Cancer Institute/NIH). The program is an unprecedented alliance of scientists, veterinarians and physicians. Drs. Duesbery and Froman are intensely focused on recruiting canine cancer patients for the study through a variety of clinical outreach programs. Samples from canine patients will not only allow the researchers to identify genes responsible for breed-specific susceptibilities (such as hemangiosarcoma in Clumber Spaniels and osteosarcoma in Greyhounds), but also to translate these discoveries into new and more precise diagnostics and therapeutics for both canine and human cancer patients. The ultimate goal is to take personalized medicine for dogs to unscaled heights!

You can find more information about this program in From Bark to Bedside: Dogs Point to Cancer Culprits found in the 31st issue of *Discoveries*, the Canine Health Foundation newsletter.

The CHCC has been developed to investigate five initial cancers in dogs, which also affect people. The first five cancers they'll be researching are:

- Hemangiosarcoma
- Osteosarcoma
- Lymphoma
- Malignant histiocytosis

Melanoma (oral and digital)

In order to move forward, they need your help. The Institute will be studying only naturally ocurring tumors, so they need the assistance of owners with dogs who develop any of the above types of cancer. They are requesting fresh (NOT in formalin) tumor samples when the dog has surgery, a biopsy or is euthanized. They also need 3 mls of blood in an EDTA (purple top) tube. If a tumor sample is not immediately available, (a dog who has had surgery, for example), a blood sample is still useful. If your dog is scheduled for surgery, please contact VARI ahead of time so they can FedEx a tumor collection kit to your veterinarian. You can contact the CHCC at 616.234.5569. You may also email Dr. Froman at roe.froman@vai.org. Consent forms and more information for veterinarians can be accessed and downloaded from their website, Helping Dogs. In addition, they are collecting DNA samples from a wide variety of healthy, purebred dogs, for use as controls. Your help is greatly appreciated.

The CGC test is open to all dogs of all ages (as long as they are old enough to have received all the necessary vaccinations such as rabies). Once you pass the test you will be awarded a certificate from the AKC - and the admiration of all who meet your well behaved pooch!!

The Canine Good Citizen Program was started in 1989 by the AKC and it promotes responsible dog ownership for owners and basic training and good manners for dogs. This program rewards dogs who are well behaved companions at home and in the community. All dogs must be kept on a leash or contained at all times unless they are in the pasture playing!! Unsupervised play is not allowed!! These are former cattle pastures and as such are partly contained using a barbwire fence. Lets not test the Veterinarian please! :-)

Also don't forget the human stuff too (ie) sun screen, bug spray, chairs, water, etc.



#### WHAT'S WRONG WITH THIS PICTURE?

My puppy is a toe biter. Am I the only one with this problem?

Are there others out there suffering with sore toes as they roam around the house barefoot, in flip-flops or sandals? If so, what are they doing to save their toes?

A search of other tormented folks on the Internet provided some interesting solutions to puppy toe biting.

#### Suggestions:

- Give the pup a teething ring.
- Say "no bite!".
- Stop playing with the pup.,
- Turn around and face the other way until she stops biting your toes.
- Give her a toy to play with.
- Scream and react with a painful expression on your face. The pup will feel your pain and stop. Become the authority figure and the pup will learn to respect you. (This person must be a cognitive theorist)

Do you also have this problem? If so what are you and I doing to reinforce this toe biting behavior?

In reinforcement theory the three most potent reinforcers aside from food and sex, are (a) eye contact, (b) touch, and (C) verbals.

When the pup bites your toes do you look him in the eye, touch him in any way, and scream and holler. If so, you have reinforced the biting behavior with all three reinforcers, eye contact, touch and verbals.

A word about punishment... IT WILL NOT WORK. Punishment will stop the behavior for the moment, but will not change it.

Enough about the academics of learning theory, I wanted immediate relief.

So I watched my older dogs and how they handled the toe biter. Hadiya would not only bite their toes, but ears and lips were also fair game.

Did they give the pup eye contact? Very briefly then turned their heads away. Was there any touching? No

Verbals YES. Each dog growled and showed their teeth as they gave brief eye contact.

Taking the clue from the older dogs, as the pup bit my toes I growled and showed my teeth, and turned my head away to avoid further eye contact after growling. Nor did I touch her. The behavior stopped. This was written 22 May. Since then eight days have elapsed with only one occasion of toe biting. This was immediately followed with my verbal growling behavior and avoidance of eye contact and touch.

Doggie Liver Treats

2 lbs Raw Beef Liver
4 eggs (you can use the whole egg for added calcium)
1 cup Molasses
4 cups flour of your choice or bread crumbs (I used Brown Rice Flour)

In a food processor puree the liver, eggs and molasses.

Pur the puree into a large mixing bowl and mix in 4 cups of your choice of flour or bread crumbs until you get a dough-like consistency.

Use a 9 x 13 baking dish....you may need to grease pan to prevent sticking.

Bake at 350 for 50-60 min.

Slice into whatever size slices work for you.

I like to slice into small bite size pieces and place small batches into sandwhich size freezer bags, and freeze all but one bag for use as needed. They freeze and thaw very quickly and easily!
