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PRESIDENT'S LETTER

A breeder friend of mine told me that their kennel was going to be inspected by the AKC for the first time in forever and I remembered that the AKC had caught some flak on the Today show and elsewhere for the way that they had allowed some breeders to pass inspection who were later alleged to be keeping dogs in unhealthy and even illegal conditions. The AKC who on numerous occasions has announced that they are only a registry of dogs has lately asserted in response to these allegations that they really do a lot as the "Dog's Champion".

According to the AKC, their inspection program claims to have done more than 55,000 inspections since 2000. They have 13 inspectors a budget of over \$2M per year. They inspect to see that the care and condition of dogs and the facility in which they are housed are examined to insure that the dogs have access to adequate food and water, are in good physical condition and have access to daily exercise. The AKC inspects to make sure that the facility is constructed in such a way as to maintain he safety of the dogs and is clean and of sufficient size so that overcrowding does not exist. They also inspect the individual dog ownership records breeding and litter records to make sure that they registrations they are given are properly supported. DNA samples may be taken as well under certain circumstances.

A breeder who fails to co-operate or who fails to correct deficiencies are subjwct to suspension from using AKC services (registration, etc.) or to compete in AKC events. Typically those suspensions carry a fine and re inspection fee to insure compliance. If unsanitary or unhealthy conditions are found during the inspection, the AKC will notify state federal and local authorities. The standard AKC fine for anyone convicted of animal cruelty is a 10 year suspension and a \$2,000.00 fine. Fines and suspensions are published in the AKC Gazette and on the AKC web in Board Minutes. Breeders who pass inspection are given a certificate of compliance.

Any AKC breeder who registers 4 to 6 more litters per year or conducts 25 or more registrations transactions per year is automatically added to the list for inspections, which are conducted on a random basis. Inspections are will also be performed in response to complaints. These complaints must be in writing and signed. The inspectors will follow upon them and will not reveal the complainant's identity unless court required.



Many of us are breeders of merit and have taken responsibility to insure the happiness and well-being of our dogs as well as integrity of our breeding programs. Unfortunately, we have all heard from customers and other breeders that there are some breeders out there who are not as concerned. Puppy buyers are very sophisticated and often will not deal with a breeder who does not answer question or allow them to see their kennel operation.

The AKC inspection program may not be perfect, but is certainly a good thing - a useful tool to assist us in maintaining our standards for healthy breeding for the dogs we all love. For more information consult the AKC website or check out AKC inspections on the web.

U-CD GRANDQUEST LEGEND'S LAST WORD CD GN RA ASCA-CD


U-CD Grandquest Legend's Last Word CD GN RA ASCA-CD, with owner/trainer/handler Linda Rehkopf, earned her Rally Advanced title with scores of 97, 98, and 99+ (out of 100 possible points). The black Lab, aka "Story," had a third and two second placements at trials hosted by the Labrador Retriever Club of the Piedmont and the Atlanta Obedience Club.

These scores also qualified Story for the 2015 AKC National Rally Championship to be held next March.



SPERMATOZOA SET NEW SPEED RECORD

The patience (and backs) of a lot of breeders have been strained trying to insure conception through the practice of elevating a bitch's hindquarters. In fact, doing an artificial insemination (AI) can be a bitch!



We have long been advised to hold her up at least ten minutes and most breeders believe twenty minutes is even better. Many experts also employ other insider tips such as simulating the tie and stimulating the bitch.

The process is frightening for many toy dogs and backbreaking work for those with large breeds.

So how long does it take for sperm cells to migrate through the female reproductive tract?

Would you believe that spermatozoa from fresh ejaculates reach the tip of the uterine horn within 25 to

120 seconds after intravaginal insemination? It's true, according to an article published in the Japanese Journal of Veterinary Science 1989;51:560-565. So, based on this information, is elevating the bitch's hindquarters for extended periods of time really necessary?

Based on the results of a research study performed by C.R.F. Pinto, B.E. Eilts, and D.L. Paccamonti, (Theriogenology 1998;50:301-305), the practice of elevating the bitch's hindquarters for more than one minute may be totally unnecessary! The study compared the success rates of two different hindquarter elevation times: 10 minutes versus 1 minute. The trial used 3 dogs and 15 bitches of proven fertility. Inseminations were performed intravaginally with fresh undiluted semen.

The study was performed at Louisiana State University School of Veterinary Medicine and reports an overall pregnancy rate of 91% with litters averaging over seven puppies in both study groups. Statistically there was no difference in pregnancy rate or litter size in this comparison of 10 minute versus 1 minute hindquarter elevation time.

Also noteworthy for breeders is that "feathering or stroking of the vulvar and perineal region was not



performed in any of the bitches" nor was there any attempt to simulate a tie by use of inflated balloons or other means. The bitches were immediately returned to their runs with no attempt to prevent sitting or urination.

In summary, the results of this study indicate that pregnancy rate in dogs with normal fertility is unaffected by reducing the hindquarter elevation time from 10 to 1 min following artificial insemination with fresh semen.

Likewise, litter size is not affected by reducing hindquarter elevation time after insemination.

Well, so much for tradition. The practices of elevating hindquarters for uncomfortable stretches of time, genital area stimulation, and crating the bitch to prevent sitting or urination are relegated to the status of "old wives tales" thanks to this study.

You've seen those ads on TV promising amazing results from all sorts of contraptions. Well, there's no need to invest in fancy equipment. If you have (or can borrow) a dog, you have everything you need to get in shape now!!! The following exercises can be done anywhere, anytime.

Inner Thighs: Place the dog's favorite toy between thighs. Press tighter than the dog can pull. Do not attempt bare legged - dogs who favor shortcuts to success will just dig the toy out. You could be damaged.

Upper Body Strength: Lift the dog - off the couch, off the bed, out of the flower bed. Repeat, repeat, repeat. As the dog ages, this exercise is reversed - onto the couch, onto the bed, into the car and so on.

Balance and Coordination, Exercise 1: Remove your puppy from unsuitable tight places. If they're too small for him, they're certainly too small for you. Do it anyway!

Balance and Coordination, Exercise 2: Practice not falling when your dog bounds across the full length of the room, sails through the air, and slams both front paws into the back of your knees.

Balance and Coordination, Exercise 3: (for use with multiple dogs) Remove all dogs from lap and answer the phone before it stops ringing.

Balance and Coordination, Exercise 4: (alternate) For older dogs, attempt to cross a room without tripping over the dog. Get off your couch without crushing any part of a sleeping elderly dog. Upper Arms: Throw the ball. Throw the squeaky toy. Throw the Frisbee. Repeat until nauseous.

Upper Arms: Inrow the ball. Inrow the squeaky toy. Inrow the Frisbee. Repeat until nauseous.

Upper Arms: (alternate) Tug the rope. Tug the pull toy. Tug the sock. Repeat until your shoulder is dislocated or the dog gives up (we all know which comes first).

Hand Coordination: Remove foreign object from dog's locked jaw. This exercise is especially popular with puppy owners. Repeat. Repeat. Remember, this is a timed exercise. Movements must be quick and precise (think concert pianist) to prevent trips to the vet, which only offer the minimal exercise benefit of jaw firming clenches.

Calves: After the dog has worn out the rest of your body, hang a circular toy on your ankle and let the dog tug while you tug back. WARNING: This is feasible only for those with strong bones and small dogs. Have you taken your calcium supplement today?

Calves: (alternate) Run after dog - pick any reason, there are plenty. Dogs of any size can be used for this exercise. Greyhounds are inadvisable.

Neck Muscles: Attempt to outmaneuver the canine tongue headed for your ear, mouth, or eyeball. This is a lifelong fitness program. A dog is never too old or too feeble to "French Kiss" you when you least expect it.
