



History
Despite the contradiction in name, the Labrador Retriever's origins can be found in Canada. Early in the 19th century an Englishman. Today the Labrador Retriever is the breed with the largest number of annual AKC registrations in the United States, and it has held that position since 1992.

Crate Training

Crate training can be a significant milestone in a puppy's early regimen. Your puppy will learn to accept its crate happily and the crate will become a mobile "home" so there will never be a problem about where to keep your dog when you travel. Finally, should your puppy require time at the veterinarian's office because of an illness, it will not be stressed if it is placed in a crate during a hospital visit. In addition, the puppy will be much easier to house train if you confine it to a crate when you cannot observe it. Puppies do not want to soil their bed so the puppy will wait to relieve itself until you take it outside. There are many types of dog crates. They can be made of plastic, wood or wire. A collapsible wire version is often the crate of choice if it is to be used within the house or when traveling by car. The puppy cannot chew it, ventilation is good, and



Dear AKC Exhibitor,

At the December Delegates meeting a change was approved to *Rules Applying to Dog Shows* Chapter 16, Section 1 in how Best of Winners points can be calculated. As always, the dog or bitch awarded Best of Winners will receive the higher number of points awarded to the Winners Dog or Winners Bitch. The change that has been approved applies to when there are no points available to either the Winners Dog or Winners Bitch. In those instances, the number of regular class dogs in both sexes are added together. When compared to the point schedule, if the total sum of regular class dogs and bitches meets or exceeds the number of competitors needed for one point in its sex, the Best of Winners will receive one championship point.

Limited Ingredient Home Cooked <u>Adult</u> Dog Food



SATIN BALLS

One of our (Lab breeders) tried and true recipes. Great for finicky eaters, especially great for those needing weight gain or "bloom".

Ingredients

10 pounds hamburger meat (Highest Fat Content)

1 lg. box of Total cereal

1 lg. box oatmeal

1 jar of wheat germ

1 1/4 cup veg oil (I use Canola)

1 1/4 cup of unsulfured molasses

10 raw eggs AND shells

10 envelopes of unflavored knox gelatin

pinch of salt

You can also add one dose of Fish oil or capsule to each ball after prepared.

Mix all ingredients together, much like you would a meatloaf. Shape into individual balls (baseball size). Freeze in qt bags, use as needed. For Labradors, feeding in addition to regular meals, give one to two satin balls per day until weight gain achieved.



No General Meeting Held - no program planned and no members in attendance


Meeting was called to a close at 7:15pm.


